Architect Mike Calvino doesn't do ordinary houses. That's why he took seven years to design and build this one.

What's with that house?

USKIN - Can a house have a soul? ¶ Can a building breathe? ¶ This one does. The house at the end of Canal Street in Ruskin is a different species from the modest bungalow-style homes on either side. 1 It towers up three stories, facing the water, but there's no clear division between inside and outside. A wall becomes a massive door. A living room becomes a balcony. \ Kitchen walls hang from the ceiling. On the top floor; bridges, parapets. In some places the floor is stamped concrete, in others wood. Sometimes it is made of glass, looking down onto the floor below. Architect Michael Calvino built this house with his own hands. ¶ He dug the foundation. He soldered the metal struts. He cut down a tree and planed the wood to make the hardwood floor. > See CALVINO, 7

Inside feels like outside

Stanley Woodruff, originally just wanted to build a regular house: a nice one-story house with an open floor plan.

Then a friend referred him to Calvino.

Calvino had never built a house before. But when Woodruff saw the models in his studio,

he was thunderstruck.
"Holy cow," he remembers thinking. "It was so different ... I just looked at it like, 'Wow, this is so far out.'

Woodruff was not a risk taker. "I've always been a very conservative person," he said. "I don't drink to excess. I don't smoke. ... I don't do crazy things. I don't bungee jump or parachute or ride a motor-

But he decided to take a gamble on the young architect whose models looked more like space stations or sailing ships than houses.

"Let's try something different," he told his wife, a dentist. "Let's have a last-hurrah

Open house

Calvino will open the house to the public from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday. The house is at 1012 Canal St. in Ruskin. For more information, call 229-3411.

He paid Calvino about \$400,000. He figured at the most, it would take two years to build the two-bedroom, 2,050-square-foot

It took nearly seven years.
"I had to have a lot of patience," Woodruff said. "Mike is probably the most brilliant guy I've ever met, but he's also a total perfection-

Calvino won't dispute that

He built the house himself, he says, so that

trust the construction to contractors.

He won't say how much more it cost him, in labor and materials, than what Woodruff paid. And he won't hazard a guess as to what

"It's like a custom car - it's worth what someone is willing to pay for it." he said. "What are you going to compare it to?"

That's a good question.

Neighbors call the house "Fort Ruskin."

Woodruff wonders if he'll be living in the next Fallingwater, if the unknown architect he hired will become the next Frank Lloyd

But that depends on what Calvino does

He's already making sketches for new houses. Houses that collect rainwater. Houses that sway with the wind. Houses that move by themselves.
